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WHY WE SHOULD MAKE MOUNTAINS OUT OF MOLES: IRELAND

BEHIND THE GLOBAL CURVE WHEN IT COMES TO MELANOMA CHECKS

Global enquiries for mole removal almost triple (197%), while Ireland sees only a

53% increase

• Spain sees the biggest increase in enquiries for mole removal – up 415% in the past

year

England tops the chart as the most expensive private mole removal treatment, with

an average price of €294 per mole, while Poland is the cheapest (€72 per mole)

• Turkey has one of the highest number of sunlight hours (2,747 per year) but has

seen the smallest increase in enquiries for mole removal (13%)

We're finally packing away the worst of our winter woolies in preparation for some better

weather. However, we should be paying close attention to our skin all year round, and not

just when it's time for shorts or bikinis, according to new research by private healthcare

search engine WhatClinic.com.

Malignant melanoma, which has been linked to sun damage, is the 9th most common cancer

in Europe^{III}, with incidence rates increasing more rapidly than any of the other top cancers

since the 1970s^[1].

Ireland has seen an increase in enquiries for mole removal, with a 53% rise in the past 12

months – however this is less than half that of neighbouring UK (127%) and only a fraction of


the global increase (197%).

Unsurprisingly, sunny countries are seeing the biggest increases in mole removal treatment.

Spain, which enjoys 2,910 hours of sunlight per year, has seen enquiries skyrocket by 415%

in the past 12 months. Procedures in Spain cost an average €150 – which is €37 more than

the average price in Ireland (€113).





Countries with less sunlight hours are also seeing large increases in enquiries; Wales has seen a 171% increase in enquiries for the procedure, while Scotland is up 142%, despite the hefty € 291 price tag.

The cheapest average prices for mole removal treatments can be found in Poland, where the procedure costs around €72, almost two thirds of the cost of the same treatment in Ireland. The country also sees 1,676 hours of sunshine a year, and has seen enquiries up by 17% in the past year.

These ten countries have seen the biggest increase in mole removal enquiries in the past year:

Survival rates vary dramatically depending on when the melanoma is caught. For example, a stage 1A diagnosis has a 95% 10 year survival rate, while stage four has a 10-year survival rate of just 10% - 15% [2].

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Emily Ross, Director of WhatClinic.com, comments: "On the whole, people are becoming a lot

more proactive when it comes to getting themselves checked for melanoma, however, Ireland

seems to be behind the curve when it comes to checking out their moles.

"Regular self-checking is a good way to start. Look for any changes that are out of the ordinary,

and don't forget about hard to check areas like the middle of your back. You may also be the first

to notice something unusual in the feel or shape of a mole on someone else's skin. Don't be

afraid to mention it to them. You could be saving their life!

"There are a number of practical options available, from a straightforward mole check-up, all the

way up to full body mole mapping - which takes photos of your body and allows comparison

over time to highlight changes.


"Mole checks should be regular and if there are any concerns, should be looked at by a qualified
